





Horace Trumbauer (1868–1938) was one of the most influential residential architects in the period from the late nineteenth century to 1930. His restrained limestone palaces and townhouses for the super rich defined a new elegance in American cities and seaside resorts. Working with some of America's most powerful families, including Vanderbilts, Goulds, Phippses, and others, Trumbauer's finesse and elegance rivaled the work of such luminaries as Stanford White, Richard Morris Hunt, and Carrère & Hastings. Michael Kathrens's book, *American Splendor: the Residential Architecture of Horace Trumbauer*, has become a classic; the revised edition features three additional chapters and fifty new color photographs not published in the original. We are happy to have Michael Kathrens return to tell us about this remarkable man and his work.

The first national museum to tell the complete story of the American Revolution is being constructed in the historic center of Philadelphia near Independence Hall and the Liberty Bell. The Museum of the American Revolution will feature a collection of objects, artifacts, manuscripts, and printed works from the Revolutionary period. Michael Quinn, the president of the American Revolution Center, which is developing the museum project, will discuss plans for the building and its collection. Mr. Quinn was president of the Montpelier Foundation, where he transformed the home of James Madison into a vibrant educational center. Before that, he was a deputy director of the Mt. Vernon’s Ladies Association.

WENDELL GARRETT
1929–2012

Wendell D. Garrett, long-time member of the American Friends of the Georgian Group advisory board, died November 14, in Williston, Vermont. He was 83. Wendell was a favorite on “Antiques Roadshow,” where he appeared every season since the show began in 1997. His specialty was American decorative arts and he was a senior vice president at Sotheby’s as well as the editor and publisher for many years of *The Magazine Antiques*. He was also a favorite with the American Friends of the Georgian Group. Over the years he regaled us with delightful talks about life and manners in the Georgian era. His talks were always informative and accompanied by many slides illustrating his themes. Wendell was a good friend to the AFGG and we will miss his expert knowledge as well as his sense of humor.




Two Wonderful Georgian Group Trips

The English Douro




In late May 2013 the AFGG members will join the Georgian Group to explore the English influence in the area of the majestic Douro River in Portugal. We will visit Unesco World Heritage Sites with Sir Thomas Croft as our guide; he has also invited us to his family's quinta on the upper reaches of the river at Pinhao; from the veranda we will enjoy timeless views over the vineyards on the valley slopes.. In Oporto we will see the English House, a private club for port merchants unchanged since the eighteenth century that is not open to the public. The English House is not a museum but a genuine retreat designed by the renowned Carr of York and supported by English expatriates. Opportunities to sip the local port will be

plentiful during this cultural adventure. Accommodations will be at the luxurious five-star Yeatman Hotel in Oporto, where all rooms have terraces overlooking the Douro.

Noble Houses of Northern Italy

Fall is the time to enjoy the fabulous noble houses of Northern Italy. We will stay at the five-star Due Torri hotel in Verona, the most stunningly romantic of Italian cities. We visit private palazzi and castles off the tourist track, our tour stretching down to Mantua and Parma and co-organized by the Marchesa Ilaria D'Oria. We will have privileged access to extraordinary eighteenth-century and earlier houses that are still lived in by the descendants of their founders, including a wine estate still run after seven hundred years by the family of Dante Alighieri. You will see magnificent but rarely seen frescoes, still radiant but untouched since the fifteenth century; enjoy alfresco sundowners with the titled owners of formidable castles that command views stretching over a hundred miles to the Alps; visit an Italian connoisseur as he completes a remarkable home—a pyramid at the center of a bamboo maze—for his life's collection of marbles and antiquarian books; and see en route some gems of Renaissance town planning, among them Sabionetta, a fifteenth-century town still enclosed by its vast moated walls.
